White House Conference on Hunger, Nutrition and Health

The Biden-Harris Administration announced that it will host a <u>White House Conference on Hunger, Nutrition, and Health</u> — the first conference of its kind held since 1969 — on **September 28 in Washington, DC**. The conference features a diverse group of experts, policy makers, and community leaders to address the nation's intersecting challenges of food insecurity and diet-related diseases. During the Conference, the White House will release a new national strategy detailing the public and private sector approaches to reduce hunger and improve nutrition and health, especially among communities most affected.
